Welcome to the second October session of the Dr. Harold C. Deutsch World War II History Round Table.

Tonight's speaker is Alex Kershaw author of *Against All Odds*, which follows the campaigns of the 3Rd Infantry Division from Africa to Bavaria. He will be joined by World War II veterans fighting to liberate Europe.

Constituted as a regular army formation for service in the Great War in November 1917, the 3rd ID first saw combat in in July 1918 during the "Second Battle of Marne," the last German offensive of the war. Stationed on the south bank of the Marne, the men of the 3rd ID were attacked by the new "Stoßtruppen" ("Stormtroopers") who crossed the river during the opening bombardment. Holding firm, the "Rock of the Marne" stopped the German advance and protected Paris. It was here, along the Marne, that Maj. Gen. Joseph Dickman coined the divisional motto as he cried out, "Nous Resterons La" ("We Shall Remain Here").

During the Second World War the 3rd ID was the only Army division to see combat on all the European fronts. After months of training in the US, the 3rd was part of the Western Task Force and landed at Fedala in French Morocco on 9 November 1942 in *OPERATION TORCH*. The division remained in Morocco, taking no part in the battles for Tunisia, but did provide security for the Casablanca Conference in January 1943.

At the conference, Chips, a German Shepherd/ Collie/Husky mix who joined

the 3rd ID as part of the Dogs for Defense program, was rumored to have sniffed out a saboteur's bomb, saving the leaders of the Grand Alliance.

In February, Maj. Gen. Lucian Truscott became commander and instituted a rigorous training program requiring the entire unit be able to march 5 miles in the first hour and 4 miles an hour thereafter — the "Truscott Trott!" On 10 July, the 3rd ID was part of the invasion of Sicily, *OPERATION HUSKY*, where Chips again distinguished himself in combat, carrying messages between his cut-off platoon and the main body and then attacking an Italian machine gun post single-pawedly to great effect.

On 18 July, they went ashore at Salerno, eight days after the invasion of the Italian mainland (OPERATION AVALANCHE). Part of the Fifth US Army, they fought along the Volturno River and at Monte Cassino and spearheaded the advance on the Winter Line. After a period of rest, on 22 January 1944, they landed at Anzio (OPERATION SHINGLE).

Reassigned to Seventh US Army, the division had a brief rest and then trained for the 15 August landings on the south of France (*OPERATION DRAGOON*) at St. Tropez. Advancing up the Rhone valley through the Vosges Mountains, the 3rd ID reached Strasbourg on the Rhine by 26 November. In January1945 the unit helped clear the Colmar Pocket and reached in the Rhine River in March. In the last month of the war, they took Nuremberg, Augsburg where they liberated a sub-camp of Dachau concentration, Munich, and at war's end they were near Salzburg, Austria.

Throughout all its operations, the 3rd ID served over 500 days in combat and became the most decorated division of World War II. The unit contained 38 Medal of Honor winners, the most famous being Audie Murphy. Maurice "Footsie" Brit who was the first soldier to receive every award for valor in a single war, and Keith Ware, a draftee who attained the rank of major general serving in three wars and was killed when antiaircraft fire brought down his command helicopter in Vietnam..

Chips was also highly decorated. He received a Purple Heart and a Silver Star, and Maj. Gen. Lucian Truscott personally pinned the Distinguished Service Cross onto Chips collar. Even though his medals were rescinded later, because of domestic prejudice against canines receiving medals, Chips retained the respect of his fellow human soldiers who un-officially awarded him a Theater Ribbon with arrowhead (for amphibious landing) and eight campaign stars. Honorably discharged from the Army, Chips returned to his civilian owners and lived out the remainder of his life.
